Arnie Cunningham and his mother, Regina, drove toward Penn State to talk with the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. As Christine battled Petunia, LeBay struggled with Arnie and his mother. Traveling about 45 MPH in light snow, they crossed the Pennsylvania Turnpike's median and ran head-on into a truck. The car exploded. The truck driver suffered a broken arm and said there were three people in the car. Police found only two bodies.

Aftermath: Dennis had overstrained his leg while trying to open the stuck door to Darnell's Garage. Dr. Arroway treated him in the hospital. Rick Mercer supervised a two-man crew put Christine in Will Darnell's crusher; she came out a 2′ x 2′ x 2′ cube. She bit a crewman; he needed stitches. About three years later, she and LeBay killed Sander Galton at a Los Angeles drive-in movie theater. [Christine]

Dick Hallorann was born. He inherited the shining from his maternal grandmother. [*The Shining*][*Doctor Sleep*]

January 1946

Kermit William Hodges was born. [End of Watch]

January 1951

Patrick Hockstetter worried that his parents might replace him with his baby brother. Suffocating Avery Hockstetter with a pillow awakened an enjoyment in killing. For the rest of his life, he killed bugs then small animals. [IT]

January 1953

Johnny Smith ice-skated backward into a hockey game on Runaround Pond in Durham, ME. He fell and hit his head, knocking himself out. When Chuck Spier woke him up, Johnny foresaw him in an explosion (February 1953). For the next seventeen years, Johnny had occasional hunches about things that would happen. [*The Dead Zone*]

January 1959

Roland LeBay ran a Western Auto hose from Christine's exhaust into her passenger compartment to kill his wife. Veronica's death was recorded as a suicide, which ended months of depression. Six months earlier, their daughter, Rita, died inside Christine. These two deaths gave Christine a supernatural power where she became self-repairing. [Christine]

January 1960

Thaddeus Beaumont entered his story, "Outside Marty's House," into *American Teen* magazine's writing contest. He heard from them five months later. [*The Dark Half*]

January 1964

Dolores St. George reverted to her maiden name, Dolores Claiborne. The previous summer, she killed her husband and made it look like an accident. [Dolores Claiborne]

"The Blue Air Compressor" and "In the Key-Chords of Dawn" appeared in the Spring issue (Vol. 1, No. 1) of *Onan*, the University of Maine at Orono's literary magazine.

January 1973, 6:45 p.m.

Vinnie Corey, David Garcia, and Bob Lawson pushed Kathy Slavin off her apartment building's roof to make room for Garcia in Jim Norman's class. ["Sometimes They Come Back"]

January 1975

On the first day after the Christmas break, Castle Rock Middle School history teacher Miss Chiles hosted Curiosity Day. Each student could ask a history-related question. She'd put any question she couldn't answer up for class discussion. Gwendy Peterson's question stimulated the most conversation: if pushing a magic button caused someone to disappear or something to be blown up, who should die or what should be blown up? Most students suggested foreign countries they perceived as a threat. [Gwendy's Button Box]

January 1977

Sam Landry started *Scarlet Town*, his first Clyde Umney novel. He wrote four more in the next ten years. ["Umney's Last Case"]

January 1980

New Tales of the Cthulhu Mythos, edited by Ramsey Campbell (Arkham House, \$14.95), with "Crouch End" (collected in Nightmares & Dreamscapes), published

January 1981

Alva Thornton gave Brett Camber a puppy. Charity Camber paid \$9 for rabies and distemper shots. A couple of months later, they called him Willie. [*Cujo*]

January 1983

"The Word Processor" (collected as "Word Processor of the Gods" in *Skeleton Crew*) appeared in the January issue (Volume 40, Number 1) of *Playboy*.

January 1984

full moon: GS&WM flagman Arnie Westrum waited out a blizzard in a tool and signal shack, nine miles from Tarker's Mills, ME. The Beast broke into the shack and killed him. [Cycle of the Werewolf]

Danny Torrance found Horace Derwent in his closet. Danny locked him away in his mind. [Doctor Sleep]

Researching copyrights at the Library of Congress, Steve Brown found that Stephen King owned the copyright to *Rage*, Richard Bachman's first book.

January 1992

January 2015

Johnny Shining Path Parker had the item Alden McCausland wanted; it cost \$2,000. Two or three days later, Alden went to pick it up; it was in a nailed crate. Johnny showed him a video of the Close Encounters of the Fourth Kind (CE4). Alden and his mother opened it the next day. It was much bigger than the one in the video. They stowed the CE4, the only firework Alden bought that year, in the garage. ["Drunken Fireworks"]

January 2016

<u>Sunday</u>: Janice Ellerton killed Martine Stover with an oxycodone overdose in Martine's feeding tube then suffocated herself in the bathtub.

Monday:

morning: Detective Pete Huntley consulted with Holly Gibney and retired detective Bill Hodges on the Stover-Ellerton murder-suicide. Holly found a Zappit Commander between the arm and cushion of Mrs. Ellerton's chair. Brady Hartsfield extended his middle finger at Nurse Ruth Scapelli. Two of her uniform buttons popped. He smiled. That afternoon, Nurse Scapelli reached into Brady's shirt, grabbed a nipple, and pinched and twisted it. His non-reaction angered her more. She threatened to do his testicles if he ever gave her the finger again. He did and smiled. She didn't know Dr. Babineau had a nannycam with a fisheye lens in Brady's room. At 8:00 p.m., the doctor confronted Ruth Scapelli about assaulting and criminally threatening a mentally-deficient patient. He gave her a Zappit and said it would all be forgotten if she tapped pink fish in the Fishin' Hole demo until their numbers summed to a 9-digit number. Dr. Babineau left; Brady Hartsfield entered through her Zappit and persuaded her to kill herself. She slashed her arms with a butcher knife.

Tuesday:

Dr. Wendell Stamos told Bill Hodges his pancreatic cancer had spread to the liver. Bill needed chemo and radiation.

Listening to a voice—Brady Hartsfield—from her Zappit, Barbara Robinson cut school. Brady tried to talk her into suicide as she walked along Martin Luther King Avenue in Lowtown. When Barbara stepped on the curb, with a black truck approaching, Dereece Neville grabbed her and clowned around with her, taking her Zappit. She kicked Neville in the shins, snatched her Zappit, and ran into the street—in front of a panel truck. Dereece tried to push her out of the way. With a broken leg, she was sent to Kiner Memorial. She told Bill Hodges that Dereece may have saved her life.

Holly Gibney found that the company that owned the Zappits, Sunrise Solutions, had gone bankrupt.

~8:00 p.m.: Brady Hartsfield, inside Al Brooks as Z-Boy, killed Mrs. Cora Babineau. He transferred from Al Brooks into Dr. Babineau. At Freddi Linklatter's apartment, he had Freddi start a repeater to search for Zappits. After five minutes, it had found one.

Wednesday:

~2:00 a.m.: In Kiner Memorial's Room 217, Brady Hartsfield returned to his body to take enough Vicodin and Ambien to kill it then went back into Dr. Babineau. He headed for Dr. Babineau's hunting camp.

>10:00 a.m.: The repeater had found and updated forty-five Zappits. At an I-47 rest area, Brady persuaded Ellen Murphy to jump out her second-floor bedroom window. The snow may have saved her life, but she broke her collarbone and three ribs.

Bill Hodges talked with Todd Schneider, the Sunrise Solutions bankruptcy trustee. Myron Zakim had bought \$80,000 worth of Zappit Commanders. They were sent to Gamez Unlimited, 442 Maritime Drive, c/o Ms. Frederica Linklatter, Brady's co-worker back in his Cyber Patrol days.

>11:04 a.m.: From Heads and Skins, the hunting camp Dr. Babineau co-owned with other doctors, Brady had Jamie Winters shoot himself.

Bill Hodges, Holly Gibney, and Jerome Robinson went to Freddi Linklatter's. Jerome cut the repeater's cables. Freddi told them Brady Hartsfield had perfected personality projection; sometimes, Z-Boy and Dr. Z were Brady.

Brady's laptop reported 248 Zappits found, but the repeater was offline. zeetheend.com showed more than 9,000 visitors.

It didn't take much shaming about her weight and overeating for Brady Hartsfield to convince Jane Ellsbury she'd be better off dead. She took her father's thirty back pain pills, OxyContin, five at a time.

Bill got in touch with Nurse Becky Helmington and found Dr. Babineau co-owned Head and Skins, a hunting camp near Thurston's Garage north of the city. Holly and Bill rented a Ford Expedition

from the Hertz at the airport. Mr. Thurston directed them to the camp. Brady caught them by surprise as they crawled in the snow toward the house. He knocked Holly out with a gun butt. A second swing broke Bill's right wrist. Inside, he had Hodges play the Fishin' Hole demo. As it relaxed Bill, and as Brady started to enter Bill's mind, a text alert on Bill's phone broke the mood. They fought. Holly woke up and shot Brady in the shoulder; he ran outside.

Brady had Dr. Babineau's FN SCAR 17S, which fired 650 rounds a minute. He set it to FULL AUTO and opened fire on the house, sweeping back and forth across the great room. Something with bright lights approached. He fired at the Tucker Sno-Cat. Driver Jerome Robinson jumped out; the Sno-Cat ran over Brady. In agony and unable to move, he pleaded with Bill Hodges to kill him. Instead, Hodges left one bullet in a Victory .38 and put the gun in Brady's hand. When Brady couldn't move it, Holly Gibney placed his hand beside his head, with the gun's muzzle against his temple. His finger wasn't on the trigger, so he pulled it telekinetically.

On the way back, Bill read the text. His daughter, Allie, wished him a happy seventieth birthday. He passed out. [*End of Watch*]

January ≥2018

Scott Carey lied when he told Doctor Bob he was still losing up to two pounds a day, Zero Day was still early March, and his current weight was 106. His true weight was around seventy pounds with Zero Day later in January.

three days later: After losing so much weight but keeping his muscle mass, walking was a series of leaps, almost like walking on the moon with its lower gravity. Scott Carey jumped down the front steps to get the mail but slipped on the crust-covered snow, slid down his front yard, and smacked into the mailbox post. He couldn't stand without slipping and falling again. With the mailbox flag, he broke through the crust to make holes for a knee then a foot. Many such holes helped him back to the steps.

Monday:

At his home, Scott Carey hosted the Dr. Ellis Party's last meal. He came clean and told them he had stopped weighing himself when his rate was three pounds a day. It had been difficult moving around with little weight but with the strength of a full-grown man.

He weighted himself: 30.2 pounds.

Doctor Bob had Bill D. Cat in a pet carrier to take him to Mike Badalamente.

following Sunday:

morning: 2.1 pounds

evening: Scott called Deirdre McComb. She strapped him in a wheelchair that kept him from floating away. She wheeled him to his front lawn; Missy Donaldson and Myra and Bob Ellis stood at the street. Deirdre released his harness. He floated above the house. When he was high enough to see Main Street and the town square, he lit a SkyLight firework. After the last sparks died out, he left Earth's gravitational field. [*Elevation*]
